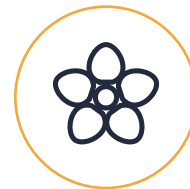

Before you start

One page for the grown-up. Everything else is for them.

What's inside

- 3 Warm-up lines — the very first pencil control
- 4 Trace the shapes, then color them in
- 5 Letters A to F, upper and lower case
- 6 Numbers 1 to 5, trace and count
- 7 Count and color — circle the right number
- 8 Join the dots, 1 to 20
- 9 A maze to find the way out
- 10 Cutting practice — straight, wavy, zigzag
- 11 Cut and paste a silly face
- 12 Color by number
- 13 A big coloring page
- 14 A certificate for the fridge

Where to start

Page 3 if they've never held a crayon much. Page 5 or 6 if they already scribble confidently. There's no order you have to follow and no page you have to finish.

Printing

Letter paper, and set your printer to Actual Size (not Fit to Page) so the tracing lines stay the right size for small hands. Black and white is fine — every page is drawn to work without color.

You'll need

Crayons or chunky pencils. Child-safe scissors and a glue stick for pages 10 and 11. That's it.

Staying safe

Pages 10 and 11 involve scissors and small paper pieces, which can be a choking hazard. You know your child and we don't — please decide what they're ready for, and stay with them.

Sharing

Print as many copies as you like, at home or in a classroom. Please don't resell it or post the file — send people to crayonandcut.com instead. That's what keeps these coming.



If a page is too hard, put it away and come back to it in a month. Nothing in here is a test, and skipping one costs nothing.

Ages 3-4

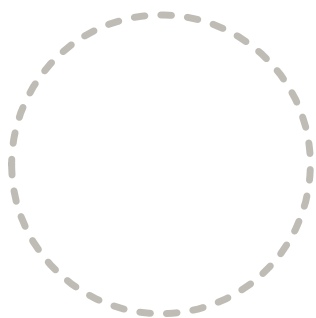
Put a crayon on the red dot and follow the line all the way to the picture. Try it slowly first, then faster.

Ages 3-5

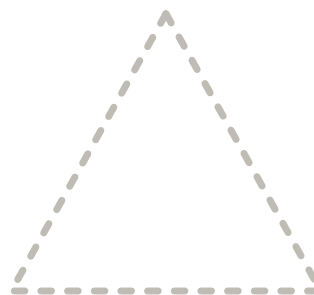
Trace the dotted line all the way around. Then color each shape in — any colors you like.

Start at 1 and draw a line to 2, then to 3, all the way to 20. Then color in whatever you found.



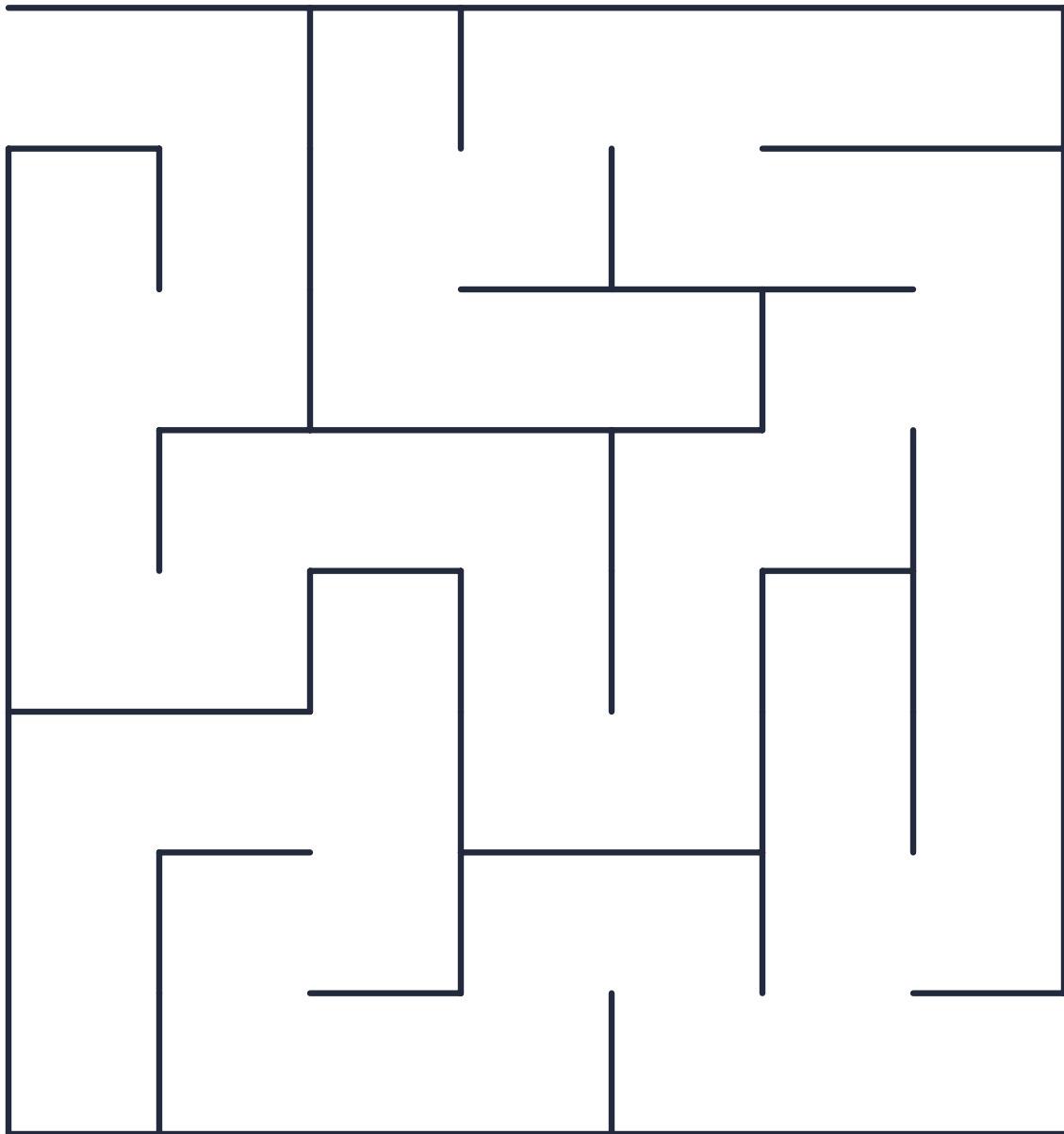
Find the Way Out

Cut along each dotted line, from the scissors to the star. The lines get trickier as you go down.

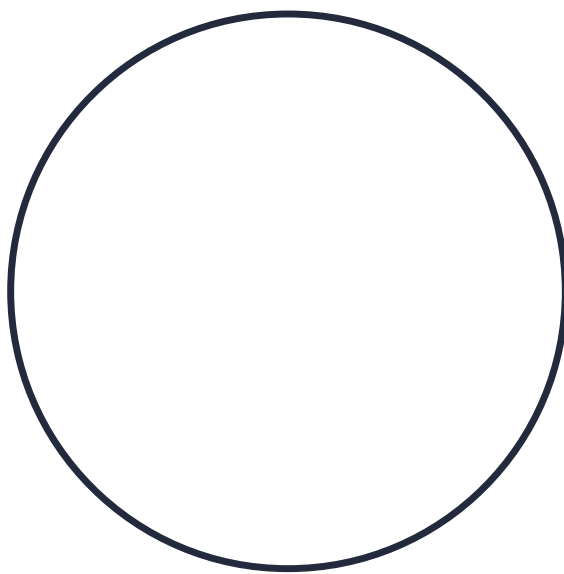


Grown-up: child-safe scissors only, and please stay within arm's reach.

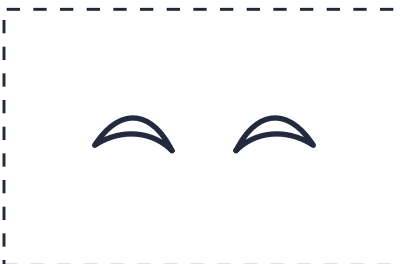
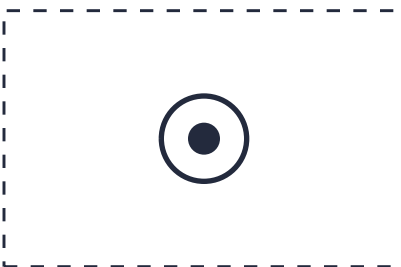
Make a Silly Face

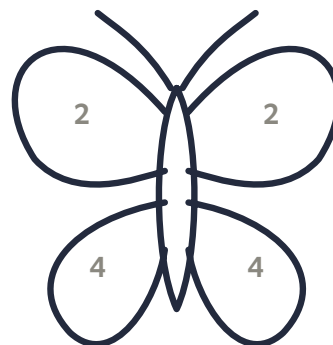
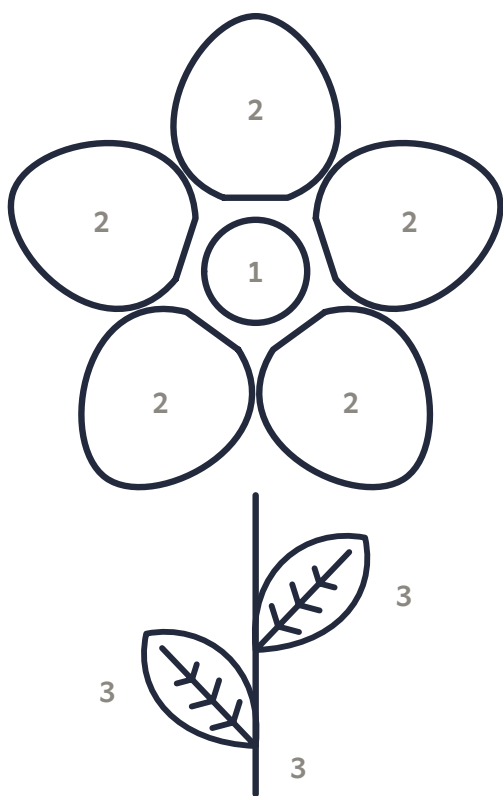
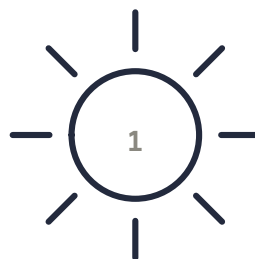


Grown-up: small paper pieces are a choking hazard — please supervise.
